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What is Refugee Week?

Refugee Week is an annual festival celebrating the contributions, creativity and resilience of refugees. Refugee Week 2021 takes place 14-20 June, with the theme <u>'We Cannot Walk Alone'</u>.

Every Refugee Week at hundreds of schools across the country, teachers help children and young people to develop an understanding of refugee experiences that they will carry with them into adult life.

There are all kinds of ways schools can get involved in Refugee Week, from holding assemblies and dedicated lessons to taking part in creative activities.

This pack has a range of learning activities and resources for children of all ages, to be explored with a teacher or educator, or an adult at home.





The Walk Education & Activity Pack (Infants, Junior and Secondary)



From July to November 2021, a giant puppet of a nine-year-old Syrian girl will walk from the Syria/Turkey border, across Europe to the UK, travelling 8000km embodying the urgent message, "Don't forget about us". The Walk, by Good Chance Theatre and Handspring Puppet Company, will be a travelling festival of art and hope in support of refugees.

Young people and schools can join in with The Walk through <u>this Education & Activity Pack</u>, themed around Amal's journey.

The pack is created for all young people with learning material and challenge activities to suit different ages. Exercises include writing poems, stories, making artwork and other creative activities.



Refugee Week: learning about isolation (12 - 18 year olds)



A <u>new resource</u> created by British Red Cross for Refugee Week 2021 to help young people develop mutual respect, empathy and understanding.

During this last year's pandemic we all might have felt lonely and isolated at times, and we know how difficult it can be. These engaging and interactive activities help learners to understand isolation from a refugee's perspective; learn what inclusion, exclusion, integration and segregation mean and how feeling alone can affect a person's experiences and what they could do to help someone feel less alone.





Culture Club (KS2, can be adapted for KS1/ EYFS)

A <u>primary education resource</u> by Groundwork, exploring the cultural heritage of refugees living in London. Made by teachers for teachers, this pack links to the national primary school curriculum, enabling pupils ages 4-11 to discover the joys of various cultures through videos, storytelling, crafts and recipes. Whether pupils are home-learning or in the classroom, Culture Clubs takes students on a journey of cultural experiences from the kitchen to the garden.

The pack aims to promote a welcoming culture where different communities can come together and share their traditions and values.



My Life is Art (Primary and Secondary)

Emmanuel Jal is a former child soldier from South Sudan, turned internationally acclaimed recording artist and activist.

In <u>this education programme</u>, Emmanuel introduces himself through a compelling presentation alongside his spoken word and music which can be used in school assemblies.

The accompanying pack offers am insight into the global issues around poverty and war with online resources and lessons centred around Emmanuel's personal experiences and delivered through a series of intimate talks, lessons and interactive activities which offer essential knowledge and practical wellbeing tools for young people.

Can we measure distance using our feet? <u>This activity</u> by Maths on Toast invites children to walk side by side with friends or family members to measure and compare footsteps. Imagine walking in someone else's footsteps! Some may have more steps to take than others, but we can all have fun moving forwards together.





A Day of Welcome, 11 June

Norfolk Schools of Sanctuary invites schools everywhere to take part in A Day of Welcome on 11 June, a day of solidarity and learning that aims to build a culture of welcome and understanding for refugees and people seeking safety.

The celebration is designed to support schools and families in marking Refugee Week and to send a clear message that for those in need of sanctuary, our communities are welcoming places.

Schools can register <u>here</u> to receive resources, suitable their age group. For schools in Norfolk, Cambridgeshire or Essex there are also additional materials which explore refugee histories in these counties.

NaTakallam Schools' Sessions

Invite a speaker who has experienced displacement first-hand to join your school or youth group for language practice or cultural exchange.

NaTakallam's School Sessions virtually connect students with an educator with lived experience of displacement from the Middle East, Latin America, or Africa, for an interactive conversation offering personal insight into global issues, or language practice.

The real-time virtual lessons can be customised for any age group, and scholarships (fee-free sessions) are available for sessions by educators from the Middle East and North Africa.

The Giant Dolls' House Project

Last Refugee Week, over 160 people from across the UK and beyond created <u>shoebox houses</u>, reflecting on their experiences of home in the light of the Covid pandemic.

One year on, the Giant Dolls' House team is again inviting people of all ages to create their own doll's houses in a shoebox, sharing their experiences of the past year or hopes for the future.

The 2021 Giant Dolls' House Project is created in solidarity with refugees and displaced people across the world and a way of showing that together, we care.

The project is accepting submissions now until 7 June, and the shoe boxes will form a giant collective dolls' house, to be shared during Refugee Week 2021.

What happens when Refugee Week is over? Here are some resources to help schools promote welcome and stand against racism and prejudice all year round.


